The Power of Unleavened Prayer (Ac. 12:1-19) by Jervis K. Djokoto (Dir. Church Health)

As early as Acts 12:1-3, not so many years after Jesus' crucifixion, King Herod stretched out his icy hands and vexed the church. He killed James, the brother of John. Then, when he (Herod) saw that this pleased jealous religious leaders, he proceeded to arrest Peter too. However, in verse 3, there is a peculiar memorandum inserted in parentheses. It says, "These were the days of unleavened bread." At first glance, this insertion may seem random, but it has many lessons for us today. And I believe it sets the stage for the miraculous events that follow in the text.

The text goes on to describe an Angel bursting into the prison cells and rescuing Peter. It may seem unbelievable, but before this miraculous event, verse 5 also mentions that "earnest prayer to God for him was being offered by the assembly."

The festival of unleavened bread holds deep significance for the Jewish Christians. It serves as a faith-filled reenactment, reminding them of their exodus from Egypt (Deut.16:3). This rescue, they now knew, foreshadowed the ultimate exodus to be experienced through Christ Jesus from a greater pharaoh, Satan himself and the world and systems that oppress God's people. Therefore, the celebration in Acts 12 must have reminded these Jewish Christians of their liberation from oppression, the forgiveness of sins, and renewal through Christ, the ultimate Paschal lamb. All these themes, I believe, were present in the Acts 12 story, but the power that unleashes all its benefits was corporate prayer.

Wesley's interpretation aligns with the essence of unleavened living – perfect love. Quoting 1 Thess. 5:16-17, Wesley once described perfect love as "rejoicing always, praying without ceasing, and giving thanks in all circumstances." (John Wesley, Sermon 43.) The Wesleyan perspective on continuous prayer, intertwined with the symbolism of unleavened living, illuminates the transformative power of prayer in the Christian journey. This, I believe, is precisely what happens in the Acts 12 story.

Large-scale spiritual renewal will never occur until people start praying. However, the foundation of prayer must be grounded in Christ, making it not only a story of perfect love that saves but also of uncorrupted prayer that brings about change.
